- III. UN & Office Updates
  - a. Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons was adopted on July 7<sup>th</sup>, 2017! It will be signed during the 2017 UN General Assembly September 20<sup>th</sup>. This is the first legally-binding international agreement to actually ban nuclear weapons, eventually leading

towards their total elimination. Long way to go still before they're all gone, but this is a huge deal. Great daily coverage of the negotiations from Reaching Critical Will!

- IV. Envoy programs recent or coming up:
  - a. Barbara's congregation is doing a UN event on Sept 21<sup>st</sup> (Int'l Day of Peace) as part of a worldwide "Poems for Peace" event. The church's Peace Action Group and the Subud Cultural Center are jointly sponsoring this UN event and will focus specifically on nuclear disarmament & the UU-UNO. Any poems recommended related to nuclear disarmament???
    - i. They'll also have a collection for the UU-UNO and say something in the service on UN Sunday, but this event is instead of a whole UN Sunday service.
  - b. Jamie is leading a monthly conversation group at the UU Congregation at Rock Tavern on "Examining Whiteness" which is a curriculum offered by the UUA. Link to the curriculum: https://www.uua.org/racial-justice/curricula/whiteness
  - c. Nancy's congregation in Duxbury is getting closer to getting on board with various justice initiatives. No UN Sunday on the calendar yet, but Nancy's trying her hardest and is hopeful that a UN Sunday service might be possible soon.
  - d. Janet's congregation is very involved with trying to become a sanctuary church and work with the climate committee. Janet wrote an article for her congregation's recent newsletter about receiving the Blue Ribbon Award at GA and urged people to continue support.
    - i. Janet came to the international reception at GA and felt it was too hectic and didn't have enough time dedicated to recognizing the UU-UNO & Blue Ribbon Congregations. Allison agrees and will report this feedback back to the staff team for consideration in next year's reception planning.

- e. Allison had a meeting this afternoon with someone from the CVSA (Commission on Voluntary Service & Action) about their current campaign to get people active on the Sustainable Development Goals! They have a toolkit to help people hold their own workshops. Someone from CVSA is going to be a guest speaker at September Envoy Conference calls! Stay tuned!
- f. Nancy: Applauds UU-UNO working with other UU organizations. That can only serve the denomination & our values! Any promotional stuff that can go to ministers and others in the congregation would be good. Allison will send Nancy 25 donation envelopes and some leftover handouts from GA. And will look into designing a poster!

Choose one of the SDGs that speaks to you and plan a project with your congregation using the suggested actions in one of the guides! The Envoy News is also a good place to look for project ideas. Each month's "Time to Act" section gives specific suggestions for things you can do. Allison recommends doing at least two projects/actions/or events per year.
